Thundersley Themes for History:



**BEFORE:** The Anglo-Saxons were settled in Britain.

WHAT HAPPENED: The Vikings came across the North Sea, just as the Anglo-Saxons had done 400 years earlier. There was a struggle for power between the Anglo-Saxons and the Vikings.

**AFTER:** In 1066 the Normans came from France and took control.
