Year 3 visit to Southend on Sea



On Tuesday, the Year 3 children visited Southend on Sea as part of their Geography topic. The children visited the Pier museum, enjoyed a trip on the Pier railway, did some Geography fieldwork and had an ice-cream! Briar Bilkey gives her account of the exciting day below:-

"Before we went on the coach we did a little word search on Southend but I only managed to find 4 though. Then the teachers put us into groups and we went on the coach. It was a bit too loud, the boys were the loudest. Once we got there we had a little wander around and saw our starting point just in case we got lost. First we went on the pier. It was very long but I enjoyed it. When we got to the end, I had a little snack and so did everyone else. We saw some fish but we didn't know what they were called. After we had been to the museum we had our lunch - I had a sausage sandwich. After our lunch we went to the beach and





we had a little play around with Fireflies as well. We had a bucket and spade and me, Dior and Bella built a tunnel and the teachers had a look and took a picture of all of us. We also got to learn how they alerted people if there was a person to be rescued or a dead body in the water. We then walked along the pier. It was one mile and 33mtrs long. It was quite wet and luckily no one slipped over. All our legs got tired too. We ate lunch at the end of the pier and then we got on the train and all sat down and half of the class sat on one side and half of the class sat on the other side and the teacher stood in the middle. When we got back from the pier we went to the beach and we wrote TPS in the sand by building sand castles. Then we ate a Rossi's ice-cream and played a bit on the field. 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District Sports



On Wednesday it was the end of our athletics season with the annual District Sports competition. This year was particularly exciting as the event was being hosted at the Athletics track at the Basildon Sporting Village. The children all arrived at school full of energy and excitement having trained hard on their events over the last few weeks. Mr. Yorston, Mr. Wilson and Mr. Jetten have been working hard with the children to improve on their personal bests and prepare them for the day. When they arrived, they sat in the stand with a fantastic view over the track and field events. The Year 3 and 4 field events were called to their areas to compete whilst the sprint heats took place on the track. There was a packed crowd of families and supporters cheering on all of the competitors. All of the sprinters ran fantastically and we found out that a number had gualified for the final. The Years 5 and 6 field events too place as the 600m races began. The boys 600m race was an incredibly close affair with the children keeping a high tempo. All our three runners ran personal bests but Harry Green excelled finishing with a silver medal. Next was the girls' 600m race and again, the race was very close and extremely fast. All our runners were fantastic but a particular well done to Grace Crawford who also secured herself a silver medal. After this came the sprint finals and a huge congratulations to Louie Seymour who finished with a gold, Lily Crawford who finished with a silver and Freddie Troth- Olasebikan who also finished with a silver, Hollie Agass who finished with a bronze and Pippa Hawkins who finished with a gold. Next were the



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relays and my goodness this was an amazing moment for Thundersley. Sensationally, the Year 3 boys got off to a golden start finishing first in their relay and the golds and silvers kept coming from there. Silver medals went to the Year 3 girls, Year 4 boys, Year 5 boys and Year 6 boys in the relay races. Gold medals were also awarded to the Year 4 girls, Year 5 girls and the Year 6 girls. This is a truly remarkable achievement for all our relay teams to finish first or second. At the end, all the schools gathered together to hear the results of the field events and the good news kept coming.....! The Years 3 and 4 events were announced with Saskia Lawledge Scott earning bronze in her throwing event, Louie Hulton and Isla Reeves finishing with a silver medal in their long jump and Poppy Ferdinando Hemmings finishing with a gold. The Years 5 and 6 field events were announced and a bronze medal went to Nathan Cirin in the vertical jump. Silvers were awarded to Alivia Pjetra for her throw, Esme Emin-Wyatt for her vertical jump and George Fillary for his long jump and gold medals were awarded to Etta-Mae Duke for her throw, Evie Gates for her vertical jump and Brooke Squirrell for her long jump. Although many children did not receive a medal all children did themselves and the school proud. They competed hard, met their challenges head on and in many cases achieved their personal bests. Finally, after the individual announcements came the overall team results and Thundersley finished 1st overall in the field, 1st overall in the track and of course this meant Thundersley finished 1st overall. Whilst this has been the same for the last two years it must be acknowledged that it is an exceptional result and not something to be taken for granted. A huge congratulations for all the children who represented us and completed our sporting calendar with a bang. This is another example of the children being the 'best they can be'. Delilah Thomas (Badgers) tells of her exciting event below:-

"This was my first ever District Sports and I was very excited. I have been training for the 600m and the relay which was good. On the coach we were trying





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not to run out of energy and tried to relax. When we got there we got into partners and walked through the carpark and got to sit in the stands where we could see all the events happening. I did the 600m first and I was nervous because I hadn't run on one of these tracks before as it was a different size. I already had an idea of what I was doing so it made it a bit easier. I was trying to pace myself as I was running and it got harder and harder but I managed to finish 4th and I ran my personal best. The last event of the day was the relay. I felt good although my legs were still hurting from the 600m race. We were practicing the change overs before the race and then when the boys had finished we went on. I ran the fourth leg and we were in the first lane.
