Year 6 Parent/Carer Involvement Session



On Tuesday, the Year 6 invited their parents/carers in to participate in a session of weaving.

Bella Blackshaw (Otters), George Cox (Squirrels) and Ava Lake (Badgers) give their accounts of the afternoon below:

"Our parents came in and we did a Mayan blanket and we had to cut a square of cardboard and then we had to cut 6 slits at the top and bottom and then we got wool and then had to put them through the slits back and forth. When we went down to the hall, we had to get a needle and we had to thread it in and out of the cardboard and then we had to tie it at the back and then take it off the cardboard. It then left a little square of crochet which we could use as a little blanket or a hanging ornament. My mum came in to help me and

she tied the back bits for me and she took it off the cardboard as I didn't know how to do that. I really liked my mum coming in as she helped me a lot and she said it was really fun too." (Bella Blackshaw)

















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"We first went in and we sat down and started to do our weaving. We cut a sheet of paper and then slid coloured strips through to make a weaved bit of



paper. Then our parents came in and we started our design plan for our real weaving. After that we started to make our looms. We cut cardboard and then put slits in the top and bottom. We then looped coloured wool through the white wool and then we kept changing colours so there was green, purple, brown, pink and blue. We didn't manage to finish it on the day but did later in the week. My Nan came in to help me and she's a craftsperson so knew a lot about craft to help. She tied the knots on the string to



help. I really enjoyed it and it was such a fun afternoon and I liked having my Nan to help. My Nan said that she enjoyed it herself too." (George Cox)

"Before our parents came in we prepared our look with cardboard and yarn. Then when our parents came in we practiced with some paper weaving. Then we chose and designed what we wanted our weaving to look like. I chose a brownie red and a dark blue. Then we had to go over and under, over and under to make the first row and then on the second row we had to do the opposite so we had to go under and over, under and over. We finished it later in the week. My mum helped me to thread

the needle and helped with some of the weaving. I really enjoyed it because I don't get to see my mum much during the school day and it was really fun." (Ava Lake)





Tag Rugby

Wednesday, a group of children from Year 6 made their way to the annual Tag Rugby



tournament hosted at Canvey Rugby Club. The children have been training hard during their lunchtimes and were well prepared for the matches. There were three pools of teams competing to make it through to the knockout stages of the competition and the children got off to a flying start with some sensational tagging, wonderful passing and marvellous team work. Their hard work and training paid off as they dominated their group, winning every match. Year 6 loved playing basketball in P.E. lessons at school this half-term and so it was with great excitement that 24











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
